	Watch for fine print and missing information. Decide what other questions should be asked, what other information is needed. Generate possible conclusions/options Make a recommendation about how to proceed.

4	Research around decision making in Williston
5	Understanding, evaluating and building arguments
	<b>Procedure paper</b> detailing steps to understanding, evaluating and building arguments with <b>application to one additional issue</b> .
6	Informal writing piece (journal) to examine the role that personal stake/investment takes in presenting an objective argument.
7	Taking and explaining your position
8	Discussing implications of your decision (both personally and for the larger community)
9	As an implication to the students' positions: develop a service project
10	Culminating activity-how will students demonstrate understanding?
